## PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear Parents,

On Friday we will come together as a school community to celebrate our Opening School Mass where we will commission our 2019 Student Leaders, Sport Leaders and Student Representative Council members. The celebration of Mass as a community is one of the defining features of a Catholic School and all are welcome to attend at 10am.

One of the things I do when I attend Mass is to reflect on the blessings in my life and give thanks to God for those blessings. In this weekend's Gospel we will hear St Luke's retelling of the story of the Sermon on the Mount, which we more commonly know as 'The Beatitudes'. St Luke's was writing for Greek communities formed by rich and poor people but those who came to see Jesus were the poor and ill. He says:

Blessed are you who are poor: yours is the kingdom of God.

Blessed are you who are hungry now: you shall be satisfied.

Blessed are you who weep now: you shall laugh.

Blessed are you when people hate you, drive you out, abuse and denounce you,

on the account of the Son of Man.

Rejoice when that day comes and dance for joy, for then your reward will be great in heaven.

Jesus is so different from us. We can sometimes relate to the poor in a condescending way. Even when we love them we do it pityingly, we call them "disadvantaged" or "less fortunate than ourselves," we want to "do things for them", even to "pray for them." Right through his life Jesus did the opposite. In the presence of those his society considered poor - the "little ones," "sinners", "tax-collectors" – he felt inspired, was filled with awe, and he told them so. "Yours is the kingdom of God," means that they are the ones who have the wisdom and the courage to make the kingdom a reality in the world. These words speak of a way to live with hope. This reading challenges us to look at the people around us in the way that Jesus did.

During his last supper Jesus called on his disciples to share a meal with him. This meal is central to our celebration of the Eucharist. The sharing of a meal is an opportunity to connect with others, give our attention and care to those at the table. On Friday our Parents and Friends Organisation will be hosting a meal for us all to share in, at our annual Welcome Picnic. We look forward to this occasion to reconnect with friends, welcome new members to our community and form new connections. Our strength as a Catholic faith community is in the relationships we have with each other and I look forward to seeing many of you there.

# **SAFE DRIVING**

Parents are asked to be considerate and patient during pick-up and drop-off times. At the moment there is a particular problem with queued traffic that blocks the flow of traffic on Station Street in the afternoons. Parents are asked to follow these practices:

- 1. Keep the flow of traffic going by moving on guickly;
- 2. If you cannot park and someone is not leaving within half a minute, please continue around the block until the next available parking space;
- 3. If you plan to stay for a chat, park a little further to allow parents making a quick pick up to get in and out as soon as possible;
- 4. Park on a surrounding street and walk to the school to collect your child;
- 5. If a school bus is coming up the street behind you, keep moving unless you are parking immediately;

We understand that these times of the day are frustrating however we have to work together to ensure the safety of the children and all road users.

# ON DEMAND WRITING

This week saw our very first writing stimulus for 2019, and what an adventure it turned out to be!

Our students were immersed in four adventure zones through the use of multiple visual and audio methods. All zones created excitement and enthusiasm and allowed students to either entertain, inform or persuade an audience.

Students were taken on safari by expert guides, their teachers! The roaring sounds of wildlife spread throughout the school and created an intense and authentic experience. This zone was hands down the most popular zone, with some students even trying on the costumes. This zone sparked conversations about animal facts, geography and climate.

The roaring sound of fire, the rain trickling through the canopy and crickets chirping, transported our students into a calm and peaceful zone. One which many were just happy to sit on the logs and swag to ponder... what type of traveller would want to experience this type of holiday?

The beach zone was beautifully blissful. It could have easily been the setting for a film or the location to delve into a juicy novel. The sounds of children splashing and laughing in the water engaged our students to help them inform their classmates about their own beach experiences.

Our fishing zone was the family zone. It was the zone where the majority of our students connected to the personal time their family spent together. It was wonderful to hear their stories and amusing to hear that some parents were very talented at catching things, other than just fish.

Writing tips for you at home:-

- Use your own adventures as stimuli for your child (their interests, admission tickets, a recipe, foreign money, photos, pamphlets you pick up while visiting places)
- Creating a love of writing does not start with 'spelling' (it actually kills it). Focus on what they want to say and who will be reading it.
- Get your child to be the writer at home (Birthday cards, shopping lists, text messages, the weekly menu)
- For gamers...write a review of their favourite game/TV show/characters. Create a new character for their game and write a backstory.
- For reluctant writers...highlights, gel pens, scented markers and whiteboards go along way.
